A holistic approach to reforms

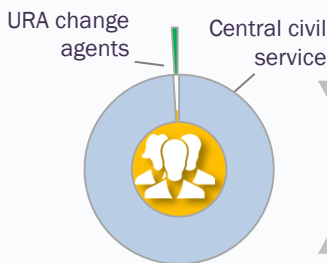
Focuses on coherence, effectiveness and sustainability of reforms

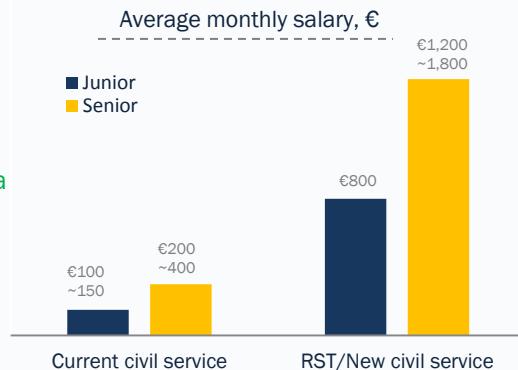
PAR – impact on around 1,000 civil servants



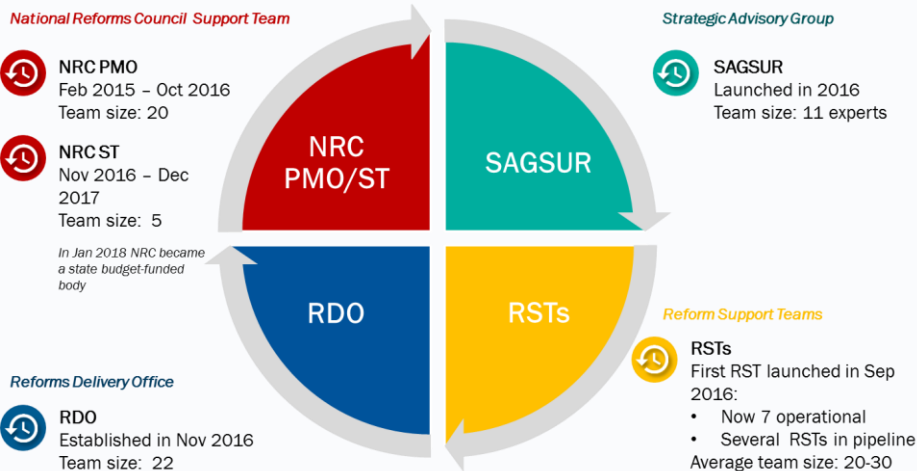
